Curtin University Library What can you do to promote Open Access?

Open Access (OA) broadens access to knowledge, enables creativity and innovation, and increases the visibility and impact of your work.

OA means removing legal, technical and accessibility barriers in order to make content freely available for people to access, share, and re-use.

Here are individual actions you can take to realise the benefits of Open Access:

Use Creative Commons licensed content

Instead of creating content from scratch, you can save time by finding, using or adapting Creative Commons licensed content at no cost. Many search engines have search filters that allow you to search by open licences (e.g. when Google Image searching, select Tools > Usage Rights > Creative Commons licences). Make sure you attribute the image appropriately and follow the licence conditions.

Attach open licences to your works

You can attach Creative Commons, or other open licences, to your works to increase the reach and impact of your activities. Consider sharing your own content (content where you are the copyright holder) under a Creative Commons licence. The Creative Commons licence. The Creative Commons licence chooser will guide you through this process.

Find OA research datasets online

Did you know that many research datasets are available under an open licence? You can search for Australian datasets on Research Data Australia.

Engage with the open pedagogy movement

If you're an educator, you can engage with the open pedagogy movement, which is revolutionising how we develop curriculum and design assessments, and contributes to higher student engagement and performance. A key outcome is the development of Open Educational Resources (OERs).

Talk to the Library about open access
